My future plans are to finish my college degree, open my own business and to travel more with my family. I also plan on being a ROCK STAR (I love to sing)!!



Join NICCA for the 2015 gathering of Tribal child care affiliates as we unite to gain knowledge, share stories, and celebrate progress for our children.

NICCA has planned a grand celebration for our biennial meeting of Tribal CCDF friends that will include an afternoon visit with leaders in DC, great sharing of program best practices, learning from a wide variety of early childhood champions, and a listening session from the Administration for Children and Families.

CCDBG/CCDF Reauthorization

#### **Increase in Tribal Set-Aside**

In FY 2013, there were 263 Grantees, representing over 500 tribes and tribal organizations that received Child Care and Development Block Grant (CCDBG) funds with tribal allocations totaling approximately \$102 million.

November 2014 saw the reauthorization of the CCDBG which allowed for an opportunity to change the Tribal set-aside language. Previous CCDBG language stated that Tribes would receive <u>between 1% and 2%</u> of allocated funds, with Tribes historically receiving 2%. Recent reauthorization of the CCDBG amended the Tribal set-aside language to state that Tribes would receive <u>no less than 2%</u> of the allocated funds.

With this past year's reauthorization, a very small increase of <u>2.5%</u> was made to the Tribal set-aside for discretionary funding. While this is an accomplishment, an additional increase in the set-aside is important especially as more tribes and tribal organizations apply for CCDF funding.

The NICCA Board and its' members will advocate and work diligently to educate legislators on the importance of additional funding to provide for the quality of service delivery to Indian children & families.

#### **Upcoming Tribal Consultations**

The OCC will be holding three official Tribal Consultations via conference calls on March 25th from 1:00 - 2:00 pm (ET); April 22nd from 1:00 - 2:00 pm (ET); and May 7th from 3:00-4:00 PM (ET). The Office of Child Care also plans to hold a face-to-face Tribal Consultation on the morning of May 20th in Washington, D.C. to coincide with ACF's Tribal Consultation.

Tribal Child Care helps to set the foundation for future leadership and healthy tribal communities for many generations. Tribal Consultation is an important part of Government to Government relations. We encourage you to reach out to your Tribal Leaders. Ask them to tell our stories and stress the importance of further support for Tribal Child Care and Native children. NICCA will be preparing documents that will assist Tribal Leaders in educating the OCC about child care issues in Indian Country. Please be looking for these in the near future and encourage your Tribal Leaders to participate in the Tribal Consultations.

#### **Child & Adult Care Food Program Reauthorization**

The deadline for the comment period on the USDA CACFP Meal Pattern Revisions Proposed Rules is April 14, 2015.

We need your input! Please forward your input to NICCA (or to the USDA) so we can include your comments within the regulatory comment period. Tribal Grantees must submit comments in order to be heard in D.C. If legislators do not hear from Tribal Child Care, we will not get the support in these mandates that are specific to tribes.

#### Peer Learning & Leaderships Network (PLLN)

The PLLN is an intentional effort to support professional development of emerging leaders within tribal CCDF communities and help offset a high turnover rate among tribal program administrators. The objective of PLLN is to develop a network of individuals who can provide mutual support in their knowledge and skill-building and who share the goal of improving the quality CCDF services to American Indian/Alaska Native children and families across the country.

This opportunity was created through the Office of Child Care (OCC) with T/TA and support through the National Tribal Center (NTC) and the Community Development Institute (CDI).

The PLLN takes a multi-dimensional approach to building a network of tribal CCDF administrators by promoting mentoring & leadership development, and providing supportive technical assistance to tribal child care programs.

**Phase One** is an intensive two-year experience including both leadership skill-building activities and training to increase the participants' knowledge base in child care relevant topics.

**Phase Two** focuses on developing Tribal CCDF Mentors. This first group of Mentors must be second-year participants of the Leadership Fellows program. Mentors provide training and technical assistance to new PLLN Leadership Fellows or a team of Fellows. Mentoring may be provided through face-to-face meetings or through calls and webinars. Mentors are expected to participate in ongoing training that supports their mentorship responsibilities.


There are currently 7 Mentors and 11 new Tribal CCDF PLLN Fellows in the current cohort who attended training in Denver, CO in January 2015. Fellows will be matched into groups and will create a child care related project that can be implemented into their communities.

It has been a very busy last quarter. We had a meeting with DHS and MNCPD on the development and progress of the Cultural Trainer/Training Project. It is now official. MnTRECC has started working with the Pilot Sites as they are developing their Local Advisory Committees and setting their first meeting date. The Guidebook has been revised and will remain as is for the first year. We will make adjustments and changes in February of next year that coincide with the Pilot Sites with kinks we may have encountered along the way. We will keep you updated as we move through this stage. It will be so awesome to have our Elders recognized for their valuable teachings they have to pass onto our educators and children.

We held our Quarterly Planning Team Meeting in Red Lake on January 23<sup>rd</sup>. Thank you Ruby for being such a great host. We all enjoyed a tour of the Red Lake Fisheries. Eric did a great job with experimenting in cooking the fish eggs. We had special guests from the "Help Me Grow" project that is in the early stage of being developed in the state of Minnesota.





We have been especially busy with providing Parent Aware Recruitment strategies. First MnTRECC provided a "Cultural Sensitivity" training in St. Cloud January 14<sup>th</sup> for state Employees. Dr. Anton Treuer graced us with his knowledge in American Indian History. It was a great turn out and a lot of positive feedback. We have also done some revisions to the Parent Aware Brochures and purchased a large amount to give to the Planning Team Members so they can distribute in their communities.

We now have Radio Ads for the months of March, April, & May with 6 different Radio stations that cover the entire state of Minnesota. We also have Parent Aware Ads in newspapers throughout the state.

The Metro Work Group has been busy as well. They held their meeting on February  $20^{th}$  at Mystic Lake. They are busy with plans for the Career Fair which is going to be held this spring at the Magnet School in St. Paul on May  $29^{th}$ . They are also working on updating the Resource Guide for the Metro area.

## Chicken Alfredo (Pasta with Cream Chicken and Broccoli)

- ☐ 1 package of pasta (12 oz.)
- 2 4 cups of broccoli flowerets (frozen package)
- 1 TBS butter
- 2 3/4 lbs. of chicken
- 2 1/3 cup of onion
- 2 1 can Cream of Chicken
- 2 1/2 cup of milk
- 2 1/2 cup of water
- 2 3 oz. of packaged cream cheese
- 3/4 cup of Parmesan Cheese

In a small bowl, whisk milk, soup, water and then cream cheese

Add mixture to chicken and heat until boiling; reduce heat to low until chicken is cooked

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease the sides and bottom of a square pan. Remove the cores from the apples and slice. Spread the apples on the bottom of the pan. Cut the margarine into small pieces and put into a medium size bowl. Add the oatmeal, brown sugar, flour and cinnamon. Using 2 knives cut the margarine into the mixture until it looks like small crumbs. Sprinkle the mixture over the top of the apples. Bake for 20 minutes.


## Grow A Pizza Garden


