Binaakwii-giizis 2022 Megwayaak– Outdoor Learning Space

In 2018, the Early Childhood Development Program began their journey to develop Megwayaak, an outdoor learning space behind the Aabinoojii Oshkii Bimadiziiwin Center and Maajiigin building in Cass Lake. This project is a collaboration between many partners within the Leech Lake Early Childhood Development Program.

What started off as a dream, is now becoming a reality! The Megwayaak project's purpose is to have a natural outdoor learning space that will support the development and well-being of the children and community of Leech Lake. It has taking a lot of effort and support to get to where it is now.

Some initial funding was provided by the University of Minnesota Extension Central Regional Sustainable Development Partnership (CRSDP) creating the opportunity for the Megwayaak project team to hire two University of Minnesota graduate students, Jessie Austin and Jordan Hedlund

Jessie Austin researched the benefits of nature-based learning and play and compiled it into a report called "The Benefits



of Nature-Based Learning and Play for Young Children's Health, Development and Well-being" Jessie also worked on assembling outdoor activity guides for teachers to use when utilizing the Megwayaak space with children.

Jordan Hedlund worked closely with the Megwayaak project team to research and develop a landscaping plan for Megwayaak which includes a trail, 3 demonstration areas, supplemental materials, and more. Find his full report here: Leech Lake Early Childhood Development's MEGWAYAAK Project (umn.edu)

Additional funding was received from MIAC to implement the plans and donations have been made from other

sources including community groups, individuals, and LLBO gaming.

Project partners hosted three Nandagikendan events on the Megwayaak trail. This event highlighted and focused on reclaiming traditional indigenous food teachings. Several knowledgeable community members connected with families to bridge the generational gap. Find more about this years event on the back page!

Right now the Megwayaak project team is working to supplement the outdoor learning guides to include Ojibwemowin and modifications for younger age groups. As well as promoting the outdoor learning space to the teachers to encourage them to use it.

It is exciting to see Megwayaak taking shape! Many berry bushes have been planted along the trail, the trails have been mulched, hummingbird feeders have been hung, and many dead trees have been removed. The landscaping plan developed by Jordan Hedlund was finally implemented this summer to include all demonstration areas and other high interest areas for children to engage and play in.
