The past few months have been busy. I am scheduled to have a booth at the "*Together We Grow*" Conference in January, to be held at the Grand Casino Mille Lacs. We are excited to finally see some providers face to face and share our program information with others. We had a fun booth at the "Boo Bash" held at the Boys and Girls Club in October.

We have updated our brochure and working on getting the pages of our website current. Our Facebook page has program information on it as well. The newsletter is created quarterly and has a lot of good info within it. We have added the Tribal Spotlight, Library Corner, and each of us has recipes or activities we add along with our program updates.

We had a Metro Work Group gathering in October, held at The Link @ Playworks. During this meeting, we had a two hour Native American Parenting Program session. Culture and Language

We will be hosting 2-day training of the adult Learning Modules 1: & Adult Learning Modules 2: Design. The training will be at the Holiday Inn Express in Baxter on Thursday, February 23rd and Friday, February 24th Vicky Hawley will be the trainer. This training is open to our approved Cultural trainers, those in the process of being approved as a Cultural Trainer and anyone interested in becoming a cultural trainer. If you are interested or know of anyone interested in becoming a trainer please send them our way.

This spring we are planning on having a Training of Trainers (TOT) in the Native American Parenting Program (NAPP) in the metro area, we started a list of people who are interested in the NAPP curriculum and will start the process of being a trainer prior to the TOT event. If you are interested in becoming a trainer in the Native American Parenting Program curriculum, please contact our office we would enjoy working with you on becoming a trainer.

The work to consolidation the Dakota Language kit is complete, instead of having a Dakota Language kit and Dakota Resources Kit, we consolidated the kits into one with a mixture of spiral and saddle stitch books, flash cards and matching game cards, the Dakota Guidebook will be updated to include the updated Early Learning Indicators of progress Ages 3-5 years and parent aware components.

I'm currently working with Nyleta seeking an Ojibwe Language speaker, to complete the audio component.

We are planning on hosting a Training of Trainer in both the Dakota and Ojibwe Language curriculum, sometime later this spring or early summer.

The work around Trainer recruitment has slowed way down, and that seems to be the trend during the winter months. I've been working with six individuals through the Cultural Trainer approval process and the Tribal Training Advisory Committee (TTAC) will meeting virtual to screen/interview these applicants and make a recommendation in December. Time seems to be the biggest factor for both the applicant and the TTAC committee.

I sit on the *Together We Grow* Conference planning committee, this year the conference will be at the Grand Mille Lac Casino & Hotel on Friday, January 27th and 28th. The highlights of this conference, Friday evening there will be a group tour at the Mille Lac Indian Museum and on Saturday morning Kim Lage will be doing a 2-hour NAPP training/Mother Nature training. MNTRECC will also have a booth and we hope you will have the opportunity to join us.

It's been busy and looking forward to be getting the curriculums and resources out into the tribal communities. Until next time, take care, be safe and stay warm. Diane

Lesson Plan Title: Christmas Grade Lever: 0-5 years

Goal: Introduction words related to Christmas cookies (these are just a few of the words)

Flour – aguyaoi bdu Mix it – icicahiya Sugar – canhanpi Butter – asanpi ihdi

Materials needed: Sugar Cookie Dough

Colored Cookie Sprinkles Paper Sugar Cookies printout

Learning Activities:

Introduce words, review color words.

Decorate paper cookies, using glue, glitter and colored cookie sprinkles. Mix up real cookie dough, practice words associated with this activity.

Cut out cookies, decorate and bake, practicing words associated with this activity.

#### Slow Cooker Shredded Chicken

Makes: four Cups Ingredients

2 lb. boneless, skinless chicken breast

½ tsp. Salt ½ tsp. Pepper

I cup Water or chicken broth (eliminate the salt if using salt)

Place chicken breast in the slow cooker crock. Add liquid, salt and pepper to the chicken Cover and cook on low 6-8 hours on low or 3-4 hours on High. Chicken should have an internal temperature of 165 F. Remove cooked chicken and shred with two forks.

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#### Chicken Taco's

Makes: 4 servings Ingredients:

2 cups Slow Cooker Shredded Chicken

2 tsp Chili Powder

1 tsp Ground Cumin

½ tsp Garlic Powder

2 Tbsp Lime Juice

4 corn tortillas or floured tortillas

Suggested Taco Toppings: Pickled onion, diced tomatoes, sliced avocado, shredded lettuce, diced onion, sliced jalapeno's, chopped cilantro, shredded cheese, salsa

Combine warm slow cooker chicken with the chili powder, cumin, garlic powder, and lime juice in a medium bowl Spoon ¼ of the chicken mixture into each tortilla & top with your favorite toppings.

A team of subject matter experts from multiple state agencies worked together to compile, review and create this updated content. ### **Library Corner**

In *A Day with Yayah*, a First Nations family goes out to forage for edibles in the woods. Grandmother passes down her knowledge of plant life. This picture book is set in the Nicola Valley, British Columbia. This book is written by Nlaka'pamux, Syilz, and Métis author Nichola Campbell and illustrated by beloved children's illustrator and author Julie Flett, who is of Cree-Métis heritage.



"Campbell captures the matter-of-fact cadence that wise Indigenous elders emanate with charm and subtle authenticity. . . Flett adds to the rich themes of resilience and resurgence with her enchanting, folk-like paintings. Together, Campbell and Flett transport readers on a bilingual learning journey with the intergenerational characters as they savour the pronunciation of each syllable of Nlaka'pamux words slowly, together. The book offers a phonetic breakdown and each Nlaka'pamux word is elegantly illustrated by Flett. . . The distinct and unbreakable resiliency of

Indigenous people is affirmed in this loving portrait of generational courage and fortitude." — Quill & Quire
