Amarin Chanthorn is the School Age Care Center Manager for the Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe's Child Care Services Program, a role in which he oversees programming that supports the academic, cultural, and emotional growth of tribal children and youth. With more than ten years of experience in education and training; and nearly two decades of dedicated service to the Leech Lake community, Amarin has become a trusted and steady presence across the reservation.

Born in Thailand, he spent his youth on the Leech Lake Reservation, Amarin's work is deeply rooted in a lifelong commitment to the well-being of Ojibwe children and the strength of Anishinaabe families. He believes that every child deserves a safe, nurturing space where they can learn, play, and grow while staying connected to their language, traditions, and community.

Amarin approaches his work with quiet determination, patience, and genuine care. Colleagues and families describe him as someone who listens deeply, solves problems thoughtfully, and always puts children first. He is excited to coordinate summer programming, welcoming community partners to share knowledge with the kids, or advocating for resources that benefit the community's youngest members, his focus remains on building a brighter future—one child and one family at a time. Outside of work, Amarin treasures time with his own family, fishing, picking mushrooms, playing with dog "George", and being outside whenever northern Minnesota allows. He is humbled by the trust the Leech Lake Band has placed in him and remains steadfast in his belief that strong, culturally grounded children are the heart of a strong nation.

Baby proofing your home

What Is Baby Proofing?

- Baby proofing is creating a safe environment free of dangers and hazards, to allow children to play and roam safely no matter where they are. This includes childproofing anything baby could yank, grab, reach or swallow
- Babies are naturally curious and like to put everything into their mouths, tugging on items, pushing buttons and playing with various objects to figure out how they work. From baby's perspective, this is all developmentally appropriate, as they're simply trying to learn more about the world around them

General Areas

- Lock up firearms & put them in safety
- Cover all electrical outlets with outlet covers
- Remove blinds with looped cords
- Place baby gates at the top and bottom of stairs
- Install safety locks on the doors & windows leading out of the house
- Install smoke detectors carbon monoxide detectors on every floor

The Kitchen

- Place lockable covers on garbage can
- Install stove knob covers
- Keep knives, dishes, & glasses out of reach
- Unplug small appliances when not in use
- Cook on back burners
- Remove tablecloths

The Living Room

- Anchor TV to wall and hide electrical cords
- Cover all sharp furniture edges and corners with safety covers
- Move tall, wobbly lamps behind furniture
- Install fireplace screens around hearths
- Install carbon monoxide and smoke detectors on every floor

The Nursery / Bedrooms

- Secure dressers and bookshelves on the wall
- Move crib away from other furniture
- Remove soft bedding & toys from crib
- Lower the crib mattress

The Bathroom / Laundry Room

- Place medications, detergent, bleach and other laundry essentials in a locked cupboard
- Install safety lock on toilet seat
- Place soft covers on bathtub spout and knobs
- Unplug and store hot items like hair dryers

LEECH LAKE SUBSIDY PROGRAM


Does your family need assistance helping pay for childcare? Our Leech Lake Subsidy Program is taking applications for families with children who meet our eligibility requirements. Our eligibility requirements are:

- Your family must live on the Leech Lake Reservation or within 10 miles of the boundaries
- Have a child age 0-12 years old
- Be employed or attending job training
- Meet income eligibility based on your household size
- Yourself or child must be enrolled in a federally recognized tribe

Reminders for all parents: Families should keep children at home if they are sick enough that they are unable to participate in regular activities and/or if they might be contagious. If a child becomes sick with a communicable disease the parent/legal guardian must notify the program within 24 hours to allow the staff to notify the families at the program.

SCHOOL AGE CHILD CARE CENTER

The Center can accommodate up to 45 children specifically within the ages between 5 - 12 years old. The facility includes three classrooms, commercial kitchen, administrative workspaces, and a full-size gymnasium. The Center is directly connected to the Dream Catcher Park as well as its own contained play area for outdoor activities. The Center is staffed with local teachers, youth assistants, and summer interns from local schools and communities. Programming will incorporate local existing youth programs, organizations, clubs, and individuals to provide a holistic-community approach to care and education. The Center is an extension of the Child Care Services Program and under the oversight of LLBO's Education Division: Early Childhood Development Department.



What Your Child Can Expect

- Anishinaabe language and culture integration in all areas of learning
- STEAM learning
- Creative activities through painting, crafting, and building concepts
- Physical activities with indoor and outdoor games and learning
- Teambuilding and social interaction
- Homework assistance from teachers and youth assistants
- Healthy tasty snacks [after-care, school releases, summer] and meals [school releases, summer]
- Field Trips and nature activities [summer]

What You Can Expect

- Year-round program includes after-school, school-release days, summer, and seasonal breaks
- Convenience collaboration with local schools and organizations for drop offs during school year
- Culturally based curriculum
- Health and safe environment with locked entries, emergency lockdown ready, and other safety features
- Build partnership with local programs and practitioners including LLBO Youth Program, B&G Club of Leech Lake, Bug-O-Nay-Ge-Shig Schools, Cass Lake-Bena Schools, area clubs, and educational role-models.
- Local teachers and mentors - the center employs teachers, mentors, and interns from the local community and schools. Your child will grow and learn with those who they'll see and are familiar to in the community.
